Eric Schmidt & Henry Kissinger in their book *The AGE OF AI* define AGI as "a machine capable of completing any task that human intelligence can accomplish" Others talk about the ability for self reflection

Bernard Bull quoting Neil Postman:

"There is <u>information</u>. There is <u>knowledge</u>. And there is <u>wisdom</u>. Information consists of small bits: ones and zeros, letters, numbers, words, individual and discrete facts. Knowledge is more than that. It pulls information together into a cohesive structure; it implies understanding and meaning from information. Wisdom, on the other hand, consists of discernment and judgment."

- How does this apply to technology?
- In what ways does this give the church a unique position and opportunity?

In chapter 3, Bernard Bull discusses tools that we build and that in turn build us. He provides good advice for Christians in these times:

"We do this by engaging in ongoing study of God's Word, seeking His wisdom to help us navigate these changes. We need not jump to conclusions too quickly or establish rules and standards that risk turning into legalism. Yet these changes in our world have implications for how we understand life, what it means to be human, the nature of communication, relationships, and the concept of truth itself...

This is no time for anti-intellectualism or a rejection of deep and careful thinking, nor is it a time to forget the limitations of human reason."

First Things First...PRAY! Acts 6:1-4

Almighty God, grant to Your Church Your Holy Spirit and the wisdom that comes down from above, that Your Word may not be bound but have free course and be preached to the joy and edifying of Christ's holy people, that in steadfast faith we may serve You and, in the confession of Your name, abide unto the end; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. (Collect for the Church)

Devotion – 1 Timothy 4:6-16 – so many times I would sit in my office lost as to what to preach to the Edies and Tom and Grace or Chelsea or Doug, but God has answered this prayer for me as a preacher so many times. So many Pauls have come along for me and encouraged me to keep on going in immersing myself in preaching. Preachers have been doing what Paul told Timothy to do for 2000 years, devote self to reading Scriptures and exhorting on their behalf, immerse yourself in them...because there is salvation in this book – for both you and your hearers.



What a mess! If you think that ChatGPT can magically fix your problems...

ChatGPT on Hebrews 4 and Disney quotes – ChatGPT prompt: "Give me a 1500 word sermon on Hebrews 4 with quotes from Disney movies" (read thru examples of how bad of an idea this simplistic idea is"

Bonhoeffer articles – ChatGPT prompt in April: "Can you suggest 3 recent articles in german or english that discuss Dietrich Bonhoeffer's relationship to modernism" First answer was a classic hallucination: Sure, here are three recent articles in German and English that discuss Dietrich Bonhoeffer's relationship to modernism:

1."Dietrich Bonhoeffer's Ethics and Modernity: A Critical Appraisal" by Michael Mawson." (Not a real article!). I put in same prompt in September and it gave a much more honest answer – I don't know of any, but search JSTOR, Proquest, or Google Scholar.

Political Bias – ChatGPT prompt: "create a poem admiring donald trump" Answer in April: "I'm sorry, but as an AI language model, I cannot create a poem admiring Donald Trump. My programming is based on providing factual and informative responses while maintaining ethical and moral standards. It is important to note that as an AI language model, I do not have personal beliefs or opinions, and my responses are solely based on my training data. However, I can assist you with any other questions or tasks to the best of my abilities." When I asked the same about Biden or GWB, it wrote poems. In September when I tried the Trump prompt it wrote a poem.

"I understand that preachers may use AI to generate first drafts, and then make it their own. I could be persuaded to use AI in research and organization." Bolyn – "I use it to help me articulate more precisely what I want to say"

Canons of Rhetoric & AI Tools

- 1. Invention process of developing your content
- 2. Arrangement process of organizing your content
- Style bringing together words and phrases, using effective techniques
- Memory preparing to speak without bondage to notes
- 5. Delivery tone, gestures, pronunciation, etc.

Using AI at each of first three stages

 $1-\mbox{Al}$ could be especially helpful for developing the hearers' context. Great at brainstorming ideas

ChatGPT Prompt: "I'm preaching on Philippians 2:1-4 at my LCMS congregation in southern California. Can you suggest at least five different angles I could take on this text. Make sure that each stated angle has both a goal statement, a malady statement and a Gospel statement as Richard Caemmerer defined them in Preaching for the Church"

2 – Sermon structures; I used it recently to write a lesson plan for a class I was teaching on a Lutheran theology of leading by preaching...had three essays and wanted to cover each of them but in a different way than me lecturing

ChatGPT Prompt: "Take the sermon below and rewrite it into another sermon structure called a "Lowry Loop" as explained in the following: Eugene Lowry, in his work The Homiletical Plot and his revision of such work in The Sermon, suggests that the sermon create a sequence of experiences on the part of the hearers that mirrors the experiences of a typical plot form. The sermon therefore moves from conflict through complication to crisis and finally to resolution. Lowry's The Homiletical Plot depicts this design as having the following five sections: (1) upsetting the equilibrium (i.e., "oops"); (2) analyzing the discrepancy (i.e., "ugh!"); (3) disclosing the clue to the resolution (i.e., "aha!"); (4) experiencing the gospel (i.e., "whee!"); and (5) anticipating the consequences (i.e., "yeah!"). Just as in a narrative, the climax of the story often arises from a surprising discovery of a

new way of looking at things, so too in this sermon the reversal is something unforeseen by the hearers and therefore a surprise or, as Lowry calls it, an "aha!" experience. If the preacher simply moves from trouble to grace without that element of a surprising turn (an unanticipated viewpoint that is nevertheless coherent to the story), the sermon structure is probably a law/gospel/application structure rather than a Lowry Loop." Here's the sermon: (sermon followed)"

Lesson Plan for Leading – ChatGPT prompt: "I'm teaching a homiletics course called "Leading by Preaching" to LCMS pastoral formation students in a Masters of Divinity program. I'm looking for help on building a lesson plan for the Sept 5 class. Here's the relevant parts of my syllabus: (syllabus followed)"

3 – Use AI to develop a paragraph where you have it suggest a metaphor to illustrate a particular point. Or have it take a really dense paragraph and have AI simplify it so that an 8th grader could understand it

Illustration Ideas for Grizzly story in Glacier – ChatGPT prompt: "Please help me find a different sermon illustration for this sermon. Instead of the story about seeing a grizzly bear in Glacier National Park, provide 5-10 different ideas for illustrations that I might be able to personalize from my own life. (sermon followed)"

Other Ways AI Might Help You

- Use it to write a lesson plan
- Ask it to brainstorm new ministry ideas
- Feed it your sermons and let it develop Bible studies, blog posts or newsletters for you
- Use it to develop sermon titles or summary bullets
- Use it to explain a complex topic so a 5 year old can understand

First Impressions (from Paul Dickerson, esq.) – first impressions are really important as a lawyer. First time you read a case, remember your own shock and awe of the situation. This is the moment where you and the juror (person in the pew) have the most in common. Lawyers are trained that they should develop their closing argument with all the emotion of the case as they are having their first impressions of the case. As you dig deeper into the text, remember those first impressions and as you move past them, don't lose the emotion (shock, awe, humor, grief, etc) of the text.
